PARTNERS IN AUTISM AWARENESS

PROGRAM WILL HELP LOCAL POLICE BETTER IDENTIFY AUTISTIC CHILDREN

North Township and Autism Speaks are working to provide training for police to better identify and relate to children with autism in order to keep them safe.

At the same time, the township is working with families with children who have the disorder to provide fun bracelets that will be an easy identifier.

The program will begin with East Chicago Police and eventually include all agencies in North Township. East Chicago officials have identified 180 special needs families that could benefit from the training.

Township Trustee Frank Mrvan credits Assistant Chief Deputy Gilda Orange for starting the program. The mother of a police officer and an autistic grandson, Orange said she just happened to be in the right place to learn about the training.

“If you didn’t know better, you wouldn’t know my grandson is autistic,” Orange said. “Because he doesn’t process thoughts and emotions like other kids, untrained police might think he is exhibiting dangerous behaviors when he isn’t. This training will help protect Justin and hundreds of others like him.”



Autism, or autism spectrum disorder, refers to a range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech and nonverbal communication, as well as by unique strengths and differences.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates 1 in 68 children in the United States have autism, effecting 1 in 42 boys and 1 in 189 girls.

TOWNSHIP HELPING CUSTODIAL PARENTS SECURE CHILD SUPPORT

Lake County Prosecutor Bernard Carter is bringing the weight of his office – and two members of his staff – to North Township’s Circle of Services to serve as a satellite office charged with helping single parents throughout the township recover monies owed to them in support of their children.

North Township Chief Deputy Virginia Carter said the idea to bring the services to the township was the brainchild of caseworker Marguerita Olson, who saw the growing number of clients in need of the services but without the means of traveling to Crown Point to get them.

“It is absolutely incredible the number of women who are not receiving the

court-ordered spousal support owed to them. We are grateful to Marguerita for recognizing the problem and helping create a solution,” Virginia Carter said.

“What this means for custodial parents and their children is living precariously through no fault of their own,” she said. “We are working with the prosecutor’s office to help stabilize our families.”

Thank you for another fantastic year!

I am proud of the progress we have made in assisting our residents by addressing needs – one by one. I want to thank my fantastic staff, who while small in number, are mighty in creating and launching programs that make township residents’ lives better.

Here are just a few of our successes:

NO MORE SECRETS: More than 100 school-age children came forward with stories of horrific abuse and the pain that it caused during our No More Secrets Sexual Abuse Prevention campaign. As a result, those children are receiving the counseling they need to move forward. Since August, we’ve trained nearly 100 educators to identify potential abuse victims and guide them to assistance.

DIAL-A-RIDE: While we continue to search for a permanent source of funding and other options to expand, Dial-a-Ride is consistently providing trips to as many as 240 residents a day and is on schedule to provide about 45,000 on-demand trips this year.

VETERANS: Thanks to the incredible generosity of our residents and success of our annual Victory for Veterans Ride, we have completed a Reflection Fountain at the southeast corner of Wicker Memorial Park. The fountain, which lights up at night, will be dedicated this spring in honor of our fallen veterans and Gold Star families. Stay tuned for details of the Reflection Fountain dedication.



Energy Assistance Program to provide greater impact and education in 2018 ...

PROGRAM TO HELP RESIDENTS WITH ENERGY EFFICIENCY

North Township is retooling its energy assistance programs to provide greater impact and education, beginning in 2018.

Chief Deputy Virginia Carter said employees are being trained to provide classes for residents to achieve even greater energy savings.

"We've moved beyond the programs where we would provide vouchers for such items as window coverings," she said. "What we want to do is equip our residents

with the knowledge to spot energy inefficiencies. Once they complete the class, we will have a host of items to help, such as LED light bulbs."

Other easy ways to save money:

- Replace your five most frequently used light fixtures with Energy Star models – save \$75 per year.
- Dial that thermostat down 7-10 degrees for eight hours per day – save 10 percent a year.
- Fix leaky faucets to save 1,661 gallons of water – save \$35.

SHOVELING HELP

North Township wants to match seniors, who need help digging out, with volunteers, who have a shovel or snowblower. During heavy snow, the township implements an automated call system to help those who are snowed-in and need help getting out of their homes.

TOWNSHIP RESTORE TEAM HELPING TO STABILIZE VETERANS

Newly created rapid response teams are stepping in to stabilize veterans and their families suffering the aftermath of a war that, for them, never ends.

North Township Trustee Frank Mrvan is working with local veterans groups to create a network of support for veterans with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and other lingering issues.

Known as Restore Team, Mrvan said the effort, which launches early next year,

will help veterans and their families with housing, education, legal issues, financial assistance and substance abuse.

"Assistance will continue until the crisis is resolved," Mrvan said. "We will not walk away from our veterans.

"The Restore Team will be the hub of our comprehensive veteran's network, which includes mental health services, food, housing and clothing – everything they need to put their lives back together."

SEEKING VOLUNTEERS

North Township is looking for volunteers to assist in stabilization efforts. We need professionals who can address veteran homelessness, legal issues, education and employment as well as volunteers who can help with groceries, clothing, tutoring and other activities that are part of daily life.
